

### What Is Happening on the Field

Preliminary and Semi-Final Round Monday Thru Saturday

Championship Round Sunday





#### 1. \*\*The Outrun (Gather)\*\*

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* The dog leaves the handler's side and runs in a wide arc around the sheep to get behind them without disturbing them.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: Dogs should make a clean, smooth outrun with minimal wasted movement. Judges deduct points for any hesitation or if the dog runs too tight and startles the sheep.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: The dog needs to end up quietly behind the sheep, setting them up for a smooth fetch.

#### 2. \*\*The Lift\*\*

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* The dog approaches the sheep and gently "lifts" them off their spot to start moving them toward the handler.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: Judges look for a calm and controlled lift. Points are lost if the sheep panic or bolt.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: The sheep should start moving calmly and in the right direction.

#### 3. \*\*The Fetch\*\*

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* The dog brings the sheep straight to the handler in a controlled manner. The handler usually stands at a post while the dog works.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: Points are deducted for crooked lines, or if the dog loses control and the sheep scatter.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: The sheep should come in a straight line to the handler.

#### 4. \*\*The Drive\*\*

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* The dog must take the sheep away from the handler, guiding them through a series of gates or markers on the field.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: Judges are looking for precise control and straight lines as the sheep pass through the gates. Points are lost if the sheep miss the gates or wander off course.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: Get the sheep through each gate smoothly and with minimal fuss.



#### 5. \*\*The Shed\*\*

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* This is where the real finesse comes in! The dog and handler work together to separate one or more sheep from the rest of the flock, as directed by the judge.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: Precision and teamwork are key here. Points are deducted if the wrong sheep are separated, or if the dog loses control.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: Cleanly separate the designated sheep without causing chaos.


#### 6. \*\*The Pen\*\*

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* The dog must now guide the sheep into a small pen while the handler holds a rope attached to the gate.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: Penning requires control and calmness. Points are lost if the sheep become skittish or if it takes too long to get them in the pen.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: Gently but confidently get all the sheep inside the pen.

#### 7. \*\*The Single\*\* Only in Semi Finals

- \*\*What's Happening?\*\* The handler and dog must separate a single sheep from the group without letting the others scatter.
- \*\*Scoring\*\*: As with the shed, precision is key. Points are deducted for mistakes in control or separation.
- \*\*Goal\*\*: Cleanly single out one sheep and keep it separate from the others.





#### \*\*Final Points Breakdown\*\*:

- Outrun: 20

- Lift: 10

- Fetch: 20

- Drive: 30 (10 for each segment)

- Shed: 10 - Pen: 10

- Single 10

#### Key Terms to Know:

- \*\*Flank\*\*: The dog moves to one side of the sheep.
- \*\*Lie Down\*\*: The command to stop or pause.
- \*\*Come Bye\*\*: The command for the dog to move clockwise around the sheep.
- \*\*Away to Me\*\*: The command for the dog to move counterclockwise around the sheep.

#### Tips for Spectators:

- Watch how calm and collected the dog is under pressure! It's all about balance and control.
- Notice the handler's whistle commands they have to be perfectly in sync with the dog's actions.
- Look for smooth lines and steady movements that's what the judges want to see!

Enjoy the action, and cheer on your favorite dogs as they work to show off their incredible skills!
